

# Assistant Psychologist

## What is an Assistant Psychologist?

Assistant psychologists typically work in health-care settings, assisting clinical and/or counselling psychologists to enhance the psychological health of service users. Usually, assistant psychologists are people who want to pursue a career in clinical or counselling psychology.

### What do Assistant Psychologists do?

The work involves applying methods and conducting tests to assess a patient's needs, devising treatment programmes and delivery therapy, monitoring a patient's progress and carrying out research. The job varies massively depending on what service you are working in, but you are supervised by a psychologist who will help guide and nurture you.

#### How do I train?

You don't have to undergo any training to be an AP, just need the basic entry requirements.

#### **Entry Requirements**

- 2.1 degree or higher in psychology or psychology related degree (BPS approved) (can also have completed a conversion course)
- Masters are desirable but not essential
- · Relevant experience (usually at least 1 year)

#### **Previous Experiences Required**

Any of the following that equate to at least 1 year:

- Experience working with vulnerable people elderly, those with physical disabilities, those with mental health problems, those with learning disabilities, people who are isolated.
- Volunteering
- Support work
- Research jobs
- Teaching assistant
- Activities coordinator

#### **Career Prospects**

Experience as an Assistant Psychologist will provide you with the opportunity to develop further into a variety of roles including Clinical Psychologist, Counselling Psychologist, Forensic Psychologist, CBT Therapist, Psychological Wellbeing Practitioner, Psychotherapist, Counsellor and many more.
